BEAUTIFICATION COMMITTEE WANTS MOORAGE MEETINGS: In order to tailor the "Clean-up, Paint-up, Fix-up" campaign to fit the specific needs of specific areas, the Beautification Committee is available for moorage meetings, Bob Eyre, chairman, announces. The Committee has three special programs it can present singly or in combination. The subjects are: (1) General Beautification (2) Painting, Roofing and General Construction and (3) Plantings, Flowers and Garden Materials. The Committee has made arrangements with a number of firms which will give Association members discounts of up to 20 per cent on presentation of their Membership Certificate. Participating firms are: Miller Paint Co., 1936 - 7th; Boysen Paint Co., 2226 Elliott; Jerry Lewis Paint Co., Fairview N. & Yale N.; Daniel Boone Paint Co., 1401 Dexter and Daly's Inc. (stains and wood preservatives), 1121 N. 36th. The American Tar Co. of 1702 N. Northlake Place, has developed an aluminum roof coating in five colors; silver, blue, gold, copper and brown. In cooperation with the company the Beautification Committee is applying this special "paint" to a houseboat roof to gain experience in its use and will make its findings available on request. The American Tar Company will offer a substantial discount on this material to Association members.

The Association has also made arrangements with the City Engineering Dept. for a more effective "clean-up" use of the drift boat "Pelican Pete", formerly operated by the Harbor Police. "Pelican Pete" is now available to pick up all manner of unsightly and dangerous floating debris. Mr. Carl Wheeler of the City Engineering Dept. is in charge. ARE YOU INTERESTED IN A CO-OP MOORAGE? Well wishers have suggested that the Association take a long and careful look at the possibility of co-operatively cwned moorages. We are preparing to do just that. Howard Larson of 2027 Fairview E., EA 2-1216, is chairman of a special committee for that purpose. All persons who would be interested in such an investment should contact him. The state's new law permitting "condominium housing" applies to houseboat moorages and opens up some interesting possibilities.

Some members have also raised the possibility of a municipal houseboat moorage. These persons will be particularly interested in a letter to the Association from Raymond I. Moore, deputy city clerk of Miami, Florida. He writes in part: "The City Hall of Miami is located on the premises of the city-owned and operated Dinner Key Marina, which provides a large docking space for all sorts of private vessels, including houseboats."

MOORAGES COMING UP FOR 12 HOMELESS FLOATING HOMES: If construction proceeds on schedule mid-May will see 12 more displaced houseboats in new moorages at 233-39 Fairview E. This badly run-down property was recently acquired by Dahl-Hendricksen Inc., who are renovating and enlarging. The Association has been working with the new owners and obtained a variance from the City Council, from the 40-foot open waterway requirement. The owners want only Association members as tenants. All the new moorages have been taken. Preference was given to owner-occupied boats. The owners have wrecked three of the six houseboats they acquired with the property but will sell the others to those who will (1) fix them up and (2) live in them. 
HOUSEBOAT NEWS FROM AMSTERDAM: A friend touring Europe writes from Amsterdam: "There are about 1,000 houseboats here. Cannot be rented but must be owner-occupied and are quite expensive to buy - cheapest \$5,000 and up to \$10,000. Very nice looking--no walks as they tie up to the edge of the canal."

ASSCCIATION ASKS AMENDMENTS TO GARBAGE FEE ORDINANCE: The Association has asked the City Council for amendments to the Garbage Collection Ordinance (No. 90379) to give houseboat moorages the same services and rates as are given all other multiple-dwelling units. Houseboats are now charged at the \$1.25 single family dwelling rate although garbage cans are in a single pick-up area the same as apartment houses which pay \$0.90. Of even more importance is an amendment to make houseboat moorages eligible for the "dumpster" (single, large container) service desired by the larger moorages.

Under the present ordinance if the moorage cwner contracts for this more desirable service the tenants are still billed \$1.25 monthly for the non-existent garbage cans. This means that to get the same service available to others, houseboat moorages must pay twice. Everybody admits that this is unfair but even under the best of conditions it takes time to amend a City Ordinance. Today we face a particularly difficult job as the entire matter of garbage collection fees is up for study and things may drag on for months.

In the hope that we can speed it up the Association is sponsoring a petition campaign. We need the signatures of all persons who oppose this kind of discrimination whether they live on houseboats or not. The petitions will be out soon. We hope every member will pitch in.
