



PASSAGE POINT PARK NEARS REALITY



If all goes well, beautiful twin "Passage Point Parks" will blossom on the north and south sides of Lake Union under the Freeway bridge. The unusual projects have been designed by Richard Haag & Associate, landscape architects, and will be funded from the Forward Thrust bond issue approved by the voters in 1968. For several years legal and procedural obstacles have cropped up and have been dealt with one by one. At an Eastlake Community Council meeting Nov. 18th, Jim DeWalt, project manager for the Park Department, says that the final step, an air rights lease from the State Highway Department, is about to be concluded. Construction may start in February or March. The above sketch shows the "South Passage Way Park" from the water. Both mini-parks will be terraced to provide maximum views of the most heavily travelled fresh water boat channel in the City. Landscaping will include trees, shrubs, grass with benches and lounging areas. Both parks will be "way stations" on the Hike Bike trails.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE HOLDING MEETINGS AT MOORAGES

The Executive Committee has inaugurated a policy of holding one of its two regular monthly meetings at a house-boat moorage instead of the office, it is announced by Richard Wagner, president. Since October three such meetings have been held and the experiment has proved successful in "taking the organization to the members". At such meetings moorage residents will be invited to attend and take up any matter they wish with the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee meets regularly the second and fourth Wednesdays. Those who want such a meeting should contact the Association for a scheduled date.

INFLATED SELLING PRICES TO BOOST MOST 1976 TAXES

The unprecedented skyrocketing of floating home selling prices during the past two years will result in substantial increases in the 1976 taxes, the Association has been informed by the office of King County Assessor Harley H. Hoppe. The Washington state constitution requires that all real and personal property be taxed on true "market value".

During the past year every houseboat was individually reevaluated as to "Market value". As this Newsletter goes to press owners will start receiving in the mails a notice entitled "1975 Listing of Personal Property". The bottom line figure is the Assessor's estimate of the "market value" of your houseboat. It is on this figure that your 1976 taxes (billing will come in February) are based. Taxes are computed by applying the millage (variable) to the market value. Due to the failure of the special school levy the millage will drop sharply. As a rule of thumb taxes payable in 1976 will be about \$14.00 per \$1,000.00 of assessed valuation.

In the communication to the Association, Donald G. Tomlan, unit supervisor, said that in determining the updated "market value" of floating homes some 96 sales "were categorized and grouped into units of comparison from which all floating homes could be evaluated". (It is estimated that during the past two years some 25% of all houseboats changed ownership.) Mr. Tomlan listed the "units of comparison" as follows:

(1) Neighborhood location (Portage Bay, Fairview, etc.)

(2) Pier location within the neighborhood.

(3) Floating home location on pier (dock end vs. inside.)

(4) Aging floating homes vs. aging floating homes.

(5) New floating homes vs. new floating homes.

"In most cases" the communication said, "the increases in assessed value are substantial. Each floating home was grouped into one or more of the categories and was compared with similar units which had been sold. From these comparisons a "market value" was established. In most cases the increases range from 100% to 200% or more with the mean average for inside older floating homes around 122%.

In discussing the communication on Nov. 13th, the Executive Committee urged all members to check the notice of assessed valuation they are now receiving. Mr. Tomlán said the Assessor's office will welcome inquires and consider all complaints. If such grievance cannot be resolved the owner may appeal the assessed valuation to the King County Board of Tax Equalization.

If you feel the estimated "market value" of your houseboat is out of line call Mr. Tomlan at 344-7522, (Address any written communication to King Co. Assessor, Personal Property Division, King Co. Administration Bldg., Seattle 98104.)

AGED OWNER OF LAST DUWAMISH HOUSEBOAT FACES BLEAK FUTURE

The once populous houseboat colony on the Duwamish river has been reduced to one and its 85 year old owner, Fred Strom, faces a bleak and uncertain future as the Port of Seattle moves to take over his River-front property for a barge terminal. The elderly former logger, shippard and lumbermill worker, came to public attention with an article by Erik Lacitus in the Seattle Times (10/16/75).

"They are going to kick me out of here and there's nothing I can do about it," Strom said. Although a landowner for many years Strom prefers the trim houseboat he built in 1935 during the depth of the depression when he had hundreds of floating neighbors. Contacted by the Floating Homes Association and Howard Droker, who is writing a history of Seattle houseboats, Strom's two big worries are (1) what the Port will give him for his property and (2) will the City permit him to remodel an aging house on nearby property he owns and is out of the path of the expanding Port. The Association is going to do what it can to help meet both problems.

The unprecedented turnover in houseboat ownership is shown in the figures for 1972 through 1974. During those three years we signed up 191 new members but 190 were dropped. This represents a net gain of one. In such situations we have to run pretty fast in order to stand still.

It is also obvious that we wasted a lot of time, material and postage trying to contact people who had sold and left the lake. The Membership Committee feels that our job includes doing something about this slippage. All of you can help by notifying the Association of any change of ownership. One way to welcome new neighbors is to invite them to join the Association. We will see to that.

FLOATING HOMES ALSO SUBJECTED TO LOAN DISCRIMINATION

As a member of the Floating Homes Association and the Central Seattle Community Council's Housing Committee. I think we on the water need to understand how the "Redlining Campaign" effects us all.


The purpose of the campaign is to stop the discriminatory mortgage and rehabilitation loan practices now prevalent. Over the past twenty years Seattle's banks and savings institutions have refused to make housing loans to people living in certain areas, defined by banks as unsuitable for development by current residents. In other words they have drawn a red line around particular neighborhoods. At the same time these institutions have engaged in "disinvestment"—that is more money flows out of these neighborhoods in terms of savings and checking accounts, that flows back in through mortgage and home improvement loans.

Over the years owners of floating homes have been subject to similar discrimination. The policies of the banks and savings institutions have encouraged new patterns of ownership and development — which they deem better risks (translate more profitable.)

The Redlining Campaign needs our support. I urge anyone who can to sign a pledge to remove their funds from redlining bank. At the moment we are only collecting pledges; no bank has yet agreed to stop its discriminatory practices and thus become the recipient of our funds. However more than two million dollars in pledges have already been collected and both Seafirst and Peoples have started to negotiate. Our tactic, called "Greenlining" has proved successful in other cities. Help make it successful here. Margaret Levi, 2037 Fairview E.


