

SMP Nears Completion

The Seattle City Council's Land Use Committee, chaired by Jim Street, is closing in on the final stages of the city's revision of Seattle's Shorelines Master Program. The SMP regulates development along Seattle's shorelines, including houseboats.

Last March, the Association submitted testimony to the Committee in three areas: we proposed raising the allowable height of rebuilds, remodels or replacements of houseboats on non-conforming docks from 16 feet to 18 feet, we disagreed with a recommendation to exclude houseboats from "UM" zones on Lake Union and Portage Bay, and we supported a "freeze" on the total number of houseboats in the city.

18 FOOT LIMIT

The Association polled its membership on the height limit last winter and received an overwhelmingly positive response to raising it. The effect of the change would be to allow 2 legal stories. The Land Use Committee responded by voting to include the new limit in the SMP last summer. Since then we have had many inquiries about whether it is actually going to happen and when. The answer is that the new limit is part of a large package, and, as such, is virtually guaranteed (whatever that may mean in a legislative context) to become law when the rest of the SMP does.

As far as specific timing is concerned, the Committee looks like it will finish its review of the SMP sometime in January or February. The full Council must then vote on it. After that, the text must be submitted to the State Department of Ecology for approval. Upon DOE's approval, it will become law.

So, if you can wait until, say, early summer '87 for your remodel, you should be able to go up to 18 feet by then.

HOUSEBOATS BANNED IN UM

However, our proposal to allow houseboats in UM zones was rejected by the Committee. The main areas designated UM are along the north shore of Lake Union from Marine Power to the Freeway Bridge and the shoreline occupied by NOAA and Lake Union Drydock. The prevailing theory these days is that marine businesses need special protection against more profitable non-water dependent uses such as residential and office buildings. This theory won out over our arguments that houseboats needed as much range as they could get.

FREEZE IN FLUX

The third area of our concern in the <u>SMP</u> remains what began as a "freeze" on the total number of houseboats in the city. The freeze concept itself has been replaced by the Committee and the Association with an idea which is being called "Safe Harbor." In its most basic form the provisions of Safe Harbor would tend to make it as easy as possible for non-conforming houseboats to find and establish new moorage if they're evicted or otherwise leave their current moorage. As of this writing the final form of this proposal has not been set, but the idea seems to have been accepted by Street and his Committee.



Association Update

TENAS CHUCK MOORAGE FEE CONFLICTS

In spite of City Council action to clarify the status of rental houseboats in the Equity Ordinance, moorage fee issues continue to fester at the Tenas Chuck moorage (2331-39 Fairview). The latest round comes as a suit for back rent filed in Seattle District court by Tenas Chuck owners, Lakeshore Moorings Inc (LMI).

Last summer, in response to substantial confusion over its intentions regarding rental houseboats in Section 10 of the Equity Ordinance, the City Council amended Section 10 to clearly state that:

1. either party may petition the Hearing Examiner, 2. the moorage owner is entitled to half a rental's profit,

3. the fee returns to the owner occupied rate upon the houseboat ceasing to be a rental. These "clarifications" were largely the result of experience with five cases on Tenas Chuck involving large fee increases imposed on new owners at the time of sale.

However, LMI has continued to press for increases beyond those allowed by the Ordinance. Lately, these increases have come in the form of what the Tenas Chuck Homeowners Association has called "decreases in services." That is, moorage residents have been denied access to traditional parking spaces and fees have been levied for pleasure boat moorage adjacent to houseboats.

Nor has LMI given up on the five new owners. On October 8th they filed suit in Seattle District Court for back rent. The five filed a counterclaim on October 31st.

JAN ALLEN PINDS MOORAGE

In August, the City Council's Urban Redevelopment Committee, chaired by Paul Kraabel, brought Association member Jan Allen one step closer to saving her home. Allen, as you may recall, was evicted by moorage owner Ken Kennedy in 1984 following an eight year legal battle which included a landmark State Supreme Court decision striking down parts of the Equity Ordinance.

Since being evicted, Allen has rattled around the lake looking for moorage without success. Finally, a year or so ago, she connected with Jeff Wright who is developing the Phoenix Moorage (2349 Fairview) as a co-op. Wright offered her a moorage if a way could be found to put part of her boat over the Fairview street right-of-way. Kraabel's committee amended the city's Building Code to make that possible.

MURIEL ECKLUND

On April 18th, 1986 the floating homes community lost a very important member of the family. Muriel Ecklund passed away. She lived at Flo-Villa on Pairview for 18 years. Muriel was one of the original fighters and founders that brought the Floating Homes Association into existance. Without her work we wouldn't be enjoying the lovely homes we do today. The Ecklunds, Carl Kings and John Southern also founded one of the first houseboat co-ops, Flo-Villa. She is survived by her husband, Del, and is greatly missed by her family, friends and community.




EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ROSTER


UPCOMING

Dear Association Member,

Earlier this year, the Financial Committee set a goal for the association to be debt free by year end. I am pleased to report that this goal has been met. As of 11/30/85, the Association has no outstanding legal bills and even has a small cash surplus!

Before the celebration begins, though, it should be noted that legal and operating expenses in 1985 has been unusually low and that a significant portion of our income was derived from an immensely successful auction.

A comparison of budgeted and actual income is as follows:
