



## TERRY PETTUS PARK



On Sunday, September 20 at 2:00 PM, Seattle Mayor Charles Royer, City Councilman Paul Kraabel, Floating Homes Association President Bill Keasler, the Rainy City Jazz Band and a cast of at least several others will gather at the mini-park at the foot of Newton Street to dedicate the site as "Terry Pettus Park."

This little park and the two others which occupy the streetends of Roanoke and Lynn just to the north along Fairview were sponsored by the floating homes community in the middle 1970's. The parks were a part of the Association's on-going effort to encourage the public to share the unique attractions of Lake Union. This 25th anniversary festival is the latest event in that same tradition.

Terry Pettus, "Mr. Houseboat," died in 1984 at 80 after a remarkable life of public service and activism. He spent his early years as a newspaperman and labor organizer. As a prominent radical, he was arrested and convicted under the Smith Act in 1952, but his conviction was overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court.

Terry helped found the Floating Homes Association in 1962 and is generally credited with saving houseboats in Seattle. He was also a force in the environmental movement to protect the state's shorelines from uncontrolled development.

Asked why he kept organizing and stirring up his neighbors, he would answer that, "A life without a cause is no life at all."

Terry lived within a block of the new park and helped build it.



## The Association

The Floating Homes Association was formed in 1962 to "preserve and protect Seattle's old and colorful houseboat community." Since its founding, the Association has been active in land use, shorelines and environmental issues.

The Association's primary goal is to provide a secure and stable environment for floating homes. We spend much of our energy promoting specific houseboat issues, such as the "Equity Ordinance" which regulates floating homes evictions and moorage fees. But as policy, the Association also takes the view that the rich variety of the Lake Union/Portage Bay waterfront makes the existence of floating homes possible and is thereby involved in a broad spectrum of activities around the lake.

We also like to throw a party now and then.
